Get ready for the solar eclipse, Northbrook!

A total solar eclipse happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, completely blocking the Sun. It's not every day that we get to experience a total solar eclipse. (Well, almost total, we'll have 95% coverage in our area.) You'll have to wait another 20 years for the next solar eclipse in the continental U.S., and you'll also have to travel to Montana or North Dakota to experience it.

If you want to impress people, you can mention that a solar eclipse occurs when the Sun, the Moon, and Earth are aligned, or in syzygy (pronounced si-zuh-jee). In astronomy, syzygy is a straight-line configuration of three or more celestial bodies in a gravitational system.

Luckily, you can witness this stellar phenomenon in Northbrook on Monday, April 8. We invite you to join us for the viewing event behind the library in Tower Rink Field starting at 1:00pm Or, if you'd rather watch the eclipse indoors, we'll also be live-streaming it in the Pollak Room.





Meet Our New Board Member **Nimesh Patel**

Nimesh recently spoke with us about his connection with libraries and what it takes to have the "right recipe" for a great library.

Nimesh Patel recently joined the six other Northbrook residents on the Libary Board who serve as advocates for the library in the community, and to provide fiscal oversight and strategic direction.

We asked Nimesh about his connection to the library, and he explained that when he and his wife Vinita began looking for a place to raise their twin sons, they prioritized good schools and community amenities. But when it came to looking at houses, the proximity to the Northbrook Public Library played the deciding factor. "Once I saw how close our house was to the library, I was sold on it right away."

Nimesh said he was interested in joining the Library Board because he felt passionately about the many offerings available in Northbrook, and wanted to find a way to give back to the community.

"Outside of my home, the library is probably my favorite place to be. So when I thought about how I could contribute more of my time to the community, the library was an easy choice." Hailing from Midland, Michigan, Nimesh graduated with an Electrical Engineering degree from Michigan State University and worked in the semiconductor industry while living in Dallas and Boston before receiving his MBA at the University of Chicago and settling in the Midwest. He is currently a Director at Convergint Technologies, LLC, focusing on strategic sourcing and product management.

In his professional life, Nimesh has worked in roles that center around collaborating with a wide range of people in different career stages, skill sets, and roles, and he looks forward to applying that experience to his role as a Board member. "Listening, reviewing information, and helping make strategic decisions to improve the overall experience for library staff and patrons in our community is something I consider a privilege," he said.

Since childhood, libraries have played an important role in Nimesh's life, starting with the Grace A. Dow Memorial Library in Midland, Michigan, which he fondly recalls as being welcoming, diverse, and supportive. He said that as soon as he visited Northbrook Public Library, he was reminded of the good feelings he had for the library of his youth. "It had the right recipe."

Over the past ten years in Northbrook, Nimesh says he has appreciated the library's supportive staff, the variety of programming and services available, and how well it continues to adapt to technological shifts. He also values its commitment to offering a wide array of lifelong learning opportunities and says he feels very fortunate to live in a community with such an excellent public library.

"No matter what my interests are in the future, I know the library will always have something for me."

We asked Nimesh what he likes to read in his free time, and he said he likes biographies and business books with an emphasis on economics.

His favorite book is *Only the Paranoid Survive* by Andy Grove. "An incredible story by someone that escaped the Nazi occupation and went on to become a proven business leader during the evolution of the semiconductor industry. It's a great guide to adapting to changes and challenges in both life and the business world." He also enjoyed *Rockonomics: A Backstage Tour of What the Music Industry Can Teach Us about Economics and Life* by Alan Kreuger, and reading the biographies of popular musicians, like Bono, Dave Grohl, and Lenny Kravitz.

Nimesh said his favorite author is probably Michael Lewis. "I like the way he tells any story while pointing out the underlying factors others are often too busy ignoring."


